The Major Sinclair Memorial Pipe Band was formed in 1957 and is currently based in Ballyclare, County Antrim.

Tommy Sands, the County Down singer, songwriter and social activist (who performed and held a workshop "Music as a Campaigning Tool" at our Summer School 2012 in Carnsore, County Wexford), has achieved something akin to legendary status in his own lifetime. From the pioneering days with the highly influential Sands Family, bringing Irish music from New York's Carnegie Hall to Moscow's Olympic Stadium, he has developed into one of the most powerful songwriters and enchanting solo performers in Ireland today.

His songwriting, which drew the admiration of the late Nobel Poet Laureate, Seamus Heaney, as well as the father of folk music, the late Pete Seeger, has prompted respected US magazine "*Sing Out*" to regard him as "the most powerful songwriter in Ireland, if not the rest of the world". His songs, like *There were Roses* and *Daughters and Sons*, which have been recorded by Joan Baez, Kathy Matthea, Dolores Keane, Sean Keane, Frank Patterson, Dick Gaughan, The Dubliners and many others, have been translated into many languages and are currently included in the English language syllabus in German secondary schools.

In Bahia, Brazil, generations of impoverished families live in palafitas, shacks built on stilts over the ocean bay. When the government threatens to reclaim the bay in the name of ecological restoration, hundreds of families are about to lose their homes.

Bay of All Saints is a lyrical portrait of three single-mothers living in the water slums during this crisis. Their individual stories of poverty unfold through visits from Norato, their big-hearted refrigerator repairman, born and raised in the palafitas. As these women rise to fight for their future, they begin to see the bay in a whole new light.

The **UK Green Film Festival**, sponsored by Friends of the Earth, comes to the Queen's Film Theatre for the first time as part of its 2014 tour. It is the UK's annual environmental film festival and is now in its fourth year. Over a single weekend, throughout the UK, the Festival screens some of the very best films from around the world, exploring some of the big environmental issues of the day.
